Introduction

Denison Mines (USA) Corp (proponent) submitted a Plan of Operations Amendment for the La Sal Mines Complex in accordance with the General Mining Law of 1872, and regulations of the US Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and US Forest Service (FS). BLM and FS are preparing an environmental assessment (EA) to evaluate the Plan of Operations Amendment. The proposed action for the EA is to approve the Plan of Operations Amendment as submitted by the proponent.

Public involvement is critical to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process. This public involvement plan describes how public involvement will be solicited, and how public comments will be used during preparation of the EA.

The public involvement process will include the following:

- Listing of the proposed action on BLM and FS internet sites
- Publication of legal notice that the Plan of Operations is available for public review
- Solicitation of public involvement through an information mailer, which will be mailed to any individual or organization who has requested it, to those who have participated in project planning, to other government agencies, and to affected tribes
- Conduct an open house meeting in La Sal, Utah
- Compilation of comments and identification of key issues for analysis in a Draft EA
- Completion of the Draft EA and legal notice of the opportunity to comment on the proposed action in the applicable newspaper of record
- Analysis of comments and incorporation into Final EA

Additional information regarding these activities is provided in the following sections.

Listing of Proposed Action on BLM and Forest Service Internet Sites

The initial step in the public participation process will be to list the proposed action on internet sites managed by BLM and FS for the purpose of informing the public about planned and on-going NEPA projects. The BLM site is called the Environmental Notification Bulletin Board, and the Forest Service site is called the Schedule of Proposed Actions. An electronic version of the Plan of Operations will also be placed on the BLM internet site for public review. This is planned to be completed by BLM and the FS by October 8, 2010.

Publication of Public Notice that the Plan of Operations is Available for Public Review

BLM regulations for locatable mining activities at 43 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 3809 require that public notice be published in a newspaper of local distribution. This public notice will advertise the availability of the Plan of Operations Amendment for public review at the BLM office in Moab, Utah, and the FS office in Monticello, UT. This is planned to be completed by October 8, 2010.

The public notice is planned to be published one time in the San Juan Record, the Moab Times Independent, and the Price Sun Advocate newspapers during the week of October 11, 2010. The filing deadline for the San Juan Record legal notice is Friday, October 8, 2010 at noon for publication on Wednesday. The publication deadline for the Moab Times Independent is 5:00 pm on Monday, October 11, 2010. The publication deadline for the Price Sun Advocate is Friday at noon for publication on the following Tuesday, and Tuesday at noon for publication the following Thursday.

The public notice will state that the Plan of Operations Amendment is available for review for a period of 30 calendar days from the date of publication of the legal notice. A draft legal notice is attached. After approval of the public notice by BLM and FS, the BLM NEPA contractor will submit the public notice to the three newspapers for publication. After publication, a notarized affidavit showing publication of the legal notice will be provided by each newspaper and placed into the project record by BLM's NEPA contractor.

Solicitation of Public Involvement through an Information Mailer

Public involvement will be solicited through an information mailer, which will request public involvement and provide a general description of the proposed action, the purpose and need for the action, and the planned NEPA process. The information mailer will be mailed to any individual or organization who has requested it, to those who have participated in previous project planning, to other government agencies, and to affected tribes. Existing NEPA mailing lists will be compiled from the local BLM and FS offices, and the combined mailing list will be supplemented, with persons living in close proximity to the La Sal Mines Complex and with any additional persons who have expressed interest in the project. The information mailer will also advertise a public meeting, which will be held in La Sal, Utah, during November, 2010. The date of this public meeting has not yet been established.

The information mailer will be sent out during the business week ending Friday, October 29, 2010. The information mailer will request that all public scoping comments be received by December 31, 2010 to allow incorporation of the comments into the EA process. The draft information mailer is attached. After review and approval of the draft information mailer, BLM's NEPA contractor will mail the

information mailer to the planned recipients. The information mailer, the address list of recipients, and all public responses will be incorporated into the project record by BLM's NEPA contractor.

Open House Meeting in La Sal, Utah

An open house meeting will be held in La Sal, Utah to provide further opportunity for public comment. The meeting is planned to occur sometime during the business week ending November 19, 2010. BLM and FS staff with project expertise, BLM's NEPA contractor, and the proponent will be present at the meeting to answer questions about the proposed action and the NEPA process. A series of wall-size maps and other information regarding the project will be available for public review. Formal presentations are not planned for the public meeting. Comments received during the public meeting will be recorded and incorporated into the project record. BLM's NEPA contractor will prepare maps and other information for the open house meeting, and provide this information to BLM and FS for review and approval prior to the meeting.

The open house meeting will be advertised in the San Juan Record, the Moab Times Independent, and the Price Sun Advocate newspapers, signs will be posted in public areas in La Sal, Utah, and the meeting will be advertised in the information mailer described previously. Advertisement of the public meeting will occur at least 15 days prior to the meeting. A draft open house meeting announcement is attached. BLM's NEPA contractor will submit the open house meeting announcement to the newspapers for publication after the draft has been reviewed and approved by BLM and FS.

After publication, notarized affidavits showing publication of advertisement for the open house meeting will be provided by the San Juan record and placed in the project record. In addition, a sign-in list of attendees of the open house meeting, and meeting notes from BLM and FS personnel will be placed in the project record by BLM's NEPA contractor.

Compilation and Analysis of Comments

The information developed throughout the initial public involvement process will be compiled and categorized by BLM's NEPA Contractor. This compiled information will then be provided to the interdisciplinary (ID) team, and an ID team meeting will to identify significant issues that require evaluation in the EA.

An issue is a point of debate, dispute, or disagreement regarding the anticipated effects of a proposed action. Council on Environmental Quality regulations at 40 CFR 1500.4 and 1501.7 require that the EA focus on issues that are significant to the proposed action. Significant issues are directly or indirectly caused by the proposed action and may lead to the development of alternative actions or other mitigation. Non-significant issues are defined as being:

- Outside of the scope of the proposed action
- Already decided by law, regulation, management area or forest plan, or other higher level decision
- Irrelevant to the decision, or
- Conjectural and not supported by scientific fact or factual evidence

An interdisciplinary process will also be to identify significant issues and develop alternative action(s) or other mitigation that may be appropriate to address those issues. All issues raised during the public participation process will be documented in the EA and/or the project record by BLM's NEPA contractor. This process is planned to be completed by Friday, March 4, 2011.

Completion of Draft EA and Legal Notice of the Opportunity to Comment

A second opportunity for public comment will be conducted at the time the draft EA is completed. The draft EA will be mailed to all persons who expressed interest in the project during the initial public involvement process, and to others who have requested it. The draft EA is planned to be completed Friday, May 20, 2011.

Public notice of the opportunity for public comment on the draft EA and the Proposed Action will be published in the San Juan Record, the Moab Times Independent, and the Price Sun Advocate newspapers. This will be the formal 30 day public comment period required by Forest Service regulations at 36 CFR 215. The 30 day public comment period is planned to commence on Thursday, May 24, 2011, when public notice is published in the Price Sun Advocate and Moab Times Independent newspaper. The public notice in the San Juan Record will be published on Wednesday, May 23, 2011. Comments received during this period will be compiled by BLM's NEPA contractor and analyzed by the interdisciplinary team. The final EA will then be prepared incorporating any changes or additions that are necessary to address the public comments. All comments and responses/resolutions will be incorporated into the EA and/or the project record.

Introduction

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the US Forest Service (FS) are conducting an Environmental Assessment (EA) of proposed activities associated with an existing uranium mine near La Sal, Utah. Denison Mines (USA) Corp (proponent) has submitted a Plan of Operations Amendment for their existing operations. This amendment would provide for additional disturbance of BLM and Forest System land, and combine two existing Plans of Operations into one document. The Plan of Operation Amendment must be approved by BLM and FS prior to commencement of the proposed activities.

You are encouraged to provide comments on this proposal. Public involvement is an critical part of the NEPA process. Public involvement at this initial phase of the NEPA process is used to scope the EA.. Scoping is used to determine significant issues and alternatives that will be analyzed in the EA.

Project Area

The La Sal Mines Complex consists of four existing underground mines: the Pandora Mine, the La Sal Mine, the Beaver Shaft Mine, and the Snowball Mine. The La Sal Mines Complex is part of a series of underground uranium mines that were previously operated by Atlas Minerals Corporation and Umetco Minerals Corporation. The complex has been in operation since the 1970's. The level of mining activity at the complex has varied since 1970 in relation to changing economic conditions.

Ore is mined underground from a network of subsurface tunnels. Ore is then hauled to the surface, and is loaded into trucks for transport to a mineral processing mill located near Blanding, Utah. Therefore, no mineral processing chemicals or mill tailings are present at the La Sal mines complex. Surface disturbance associated with the mining operation includes:

- Ventilation shafts, which are vertical bore holes that allow air to enter or exhaust from the underground tunnels;
- Buildings and other ancillary infrastructure necessary to support the underground mines;
- Development rock storage areas, which contain rock that must be excavated to reach ore within the underground mine.

The La Sal Mines Complex is located on a mixture of land ownership. These include federal lands managed by either BLM or FS, and private and state lands not subject to BLM or FS regulatory jurisdiction. The mine is also regulated by the State of Utah, who has regulatory jurisdiction that applies to federal, state and private lands.

Purpose and Need for Action

The Purpose and Need for this action is to allow the proponent to exercise their rights under US mining laws while protecting the environment in accordance with BLM and FS regulations for locatable minerals. The Purpose and Need has several components. The proponent has a right to mine on federal lands at the La Sal Complex set forth by the General Mining Law of 1872 as amended. However, the proponent must comply with BLM and FS regulations for locatable mineral operations. BLM and FS have the responsibility to protect surface resources of public lands that they manage, and to conduct appropriate environmental analyses as required by NEPA prior to approving the Plan of Operations Amendment.

The General Mining Law of 1872 as amended provides for discovery, right of possession, and location of mining claims on lands reserved from the public domain and open to mineral entry. BLM and FS lands proposed to be affected by the proponent are lands reserved from the public domain and open to mineral entry. Minerals that may be claimed under authority of the General Mining Law of 1872 are termed “locatable” minerals. Uranium and vanadium, the primary commodities mined at the La Sal Complex, are locatable minerals. By staking mining claims and discovering a valuable uranium deposit, the proponent has established a statutory right to mine on public lands at the La Sal Complex. BLM and FS have an obligation to allow the proponent to exercise these rights as long as the proponent complies with BLM and FS mining regulations.

BLM regulations for locatable minerals are set forth at 43 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) CFR 3809. These regulations apply only to mining activities conducted on BLM managed lands. BLM will review the Plan of Operations Amendment to determine if it meets content requirements, and environmental performance standards. BLM will also consider whether the proposed project would cause unnecessary or undue degradation of public lands. BLM may approve the Plan of Operations Amendment as submitted, approve the Plan of Operations Amendment subject to changes or conditions to meet the performance standards, or disapprove the Plan of Operations Amendment. BLM may disapprove the Plan of Operations Amendment if it does not meet applicable content requirements, proposes operations on lands withdrawn from operation of mining laws, or proposes operations that would result in unnecessary or undue degradation of public lands.

Forest Service authority to regulate locatable mining activities is set forth in 36 CFR 228 Subpart A. These regulations apply only to lands managed by the Forest Service. The regulations require that the mining operations be conducted, insofar as possible, in a manner which minimizes adverse impacts to National Forest System surface resources. The Plan of Operation must detail the steps the operator will take to mitigate adverse environmental impacts to surface resources on Forest System land. The Forest Service has authority to approve the Plan of Operations Amendment or to require modifications to the Plan of Operations Amendment prior to approval.

Proposed Action

The Proposed Action is to approve the Plan of Operations Amendment as submitted by the proponent. The Plan was submitted to BLM and FS on December 10, 2009 in accordance with the proponent's rights under the General Mining Law of 1872 and BLM and FS mining regulations. Alternative actions will also be considered. These alternative actions will be developed based on the results of this and other scoping activities.

The proposed action would approve the following activities on public lands managed by BLM and FS:

- Expansion of an existing development rock pile at the Pandora Mine
- Temporary construction of drilling sites and access trails for exploration drilling
- Installation of ventilation holes to provide for inflow and exhaust of air to support underground mining, and
- Compilation of activities previously approved by two existing BLM Plans of Operations, one FS Plan of Operations, and associated amendments into one Plan of Operations that will address the entire La Sal Mines Complex

The Plan of Operations Amendment proposes modification of an existing rock storage facility at the Pandora mine. This would affect approximately 6.5 acres of additional land at the Pandora Mine. The rock storage facility is proposed to be reclaimed by re-grading the rock, providing for surface water drainage, placing topsoil, and planting native vegetation.

Drilling sites and access roads are also proposed to support on-going exploration and development drilling. These activities are necessary to define the extent of uranium ore bodies at the La Sal Complex. This work is integral to the overall mining process, and is expected to be on-going between the years of 2010 through 2030. The drilling process requires access for a truck-mounted drill rig and ancillary support vehicles, and construction of temporary drill sites. Surface disturbance is only required for the time that is required to drill and then plug the bore hole. Therefore, reclamation of disturbance caused by drilling activities is proposed to be conducted seasonally after drilling operations cease in an area. This will limit the overall disturbance to BLM and FS surface resources that would be present at any given time.

Up to 24 vent holes are proposed to be installed between 2010 through 2030 as required by the on-going mining operations. These holes are vertical shafts of approximately 6 feet diameter, which extend from the surface into the underground workings. The surface openings into the ventilation shafts will be secured with metal protective structures during mining operations. Ventilation shafts will be reclaimed after mining ceases at the La Sal complex.

Compilation of the previously approved Plans of Operations into one document is proposed to simplify regulation of the mine disturbance by BLM and FS, and to facilitate efficient environmental compliance by the proponent. This is primarily an administrative task that does not require re-approval of previously approved components of the operation.

Planning Process

Solicitation of public involvement during scoping is an initial and critical step in NEPA analysis of the proposed action. The scoping process facilitates consideration of concerns, issues, and alternatives identified by the public, cooperating agencies, BLM and FS during the NEPA analysis. This reduces the chance of overlooking an important issue or a reasonable alternative during completion of the EA. BLM and FS currently plan to consider issues related to air quality, surface water, groundwater, geology, radiological, soil, vegetation, wildlife, cultural, paleontological and socioeconomic resource areas.

BLM and FS also plan to evaluate a range of alternatives. These include the Proposed Action and at least two alternative actions. The alternative actions would include a “no action” alternative that would not approve the Plan of Operations, and an alternative that would require modifications to the Plan of Operations prior to approval. The “no action” alternative must be analyzed during the NEPA process in accordance with regulations, but it does not meet the Purpose and Need and cannot be selected. The alternative requiring modifications to the Plan of Operations prior to approval would be developed during the planning process based, in part, on results of public scoping. The purpose of this alternative is to provide for additional opportunities for surface resource protection based on results of the NEPA analysis.

The planning process for the proposed action will include the following:

- Listing of the proposed action on the BLM Environmental Notification Bulletin Board and the FS Schedule of Proposed Actions
- Publication of a legal notice in a newspaper of local distribution of the availability of the Plan of Operations Amendment for public review
- Solicitation of public involvement through this information mailer
- Holding an open house meeting in La Sal, Utah
- Compilation and analysis of comments and identification of significant issues and alternatives for analysis in a Draft EA
- Completion of Draft EA and legal notice of the opportunity to comment on the proposed action in the applicable newspaper of record
- Completion of final EA and decision document

The amendment would also combine two existing BLM Plans of Operations, one FS Plan of Operations, and associated amendments into one document to facilitate effective regulation of surface disturbing activities by BLM and FS, and provide for efficient environmental compliance by the proponent.
